# **Goodwill Success Story: Seeking a Second Chance**

Mark Hopkins spent 17 months in prison and was living in a half-way house. If able to stay employed for 90 days and exhibit good conduct, Mark would be eligible for early release from the half-way house. Mark was very motivated to reach this goal because he wants to be reunited with his wife and children in Elko. But he was feeling very frustrated and stressed since he had been to several other agencies and no one could help him find a job.

Then someone at the half-way house recommended he visit Goodwill. Mark was skeptical but met with a Career Coach who helped with his resume and conducted a mock interview with him. The Career Coach knew of a job opening with a company who wanted to hire "on the spot" for drivers so she issued Mark a clothing voucher for interview clothes and a bus pass so he could get to the interview.

Mark returned later with a job offer and was very happy with the staff at Goodwill for helping him. "I came in one day to get some help after I had struck out everywhere else and the people at Goodwill were so helpful with everything I needed, says Mark. "I got a job my second day I came in. Doing what I like to do too!" Mark is on his way to being reunited with his family.

# **Goodwill Success Story: Escaping Violence for a Second Chance**

Reeta was married when she sought refuge at Shade Tree, a shelter for women and children escaping domestic violence.

She was not in the shelter long, when she attended a resume review workshop taught by Goodwill Career Coach Brad Devlin, Goodwill of Southern Nevada has been offering mobile career services at Shade Tree, Veteran's Village and Resolutions locations for the past year.

After the workshop, she met one-on-one with Brad to rework her resume. Being in her early 30's and having a three-page resume just wasn't practical. Her long resume and difficulty with knowing how to search for a job were the barriers to her getting employment and she needed a job. Shade Tree shelter residents have only 90 days they are permitted to stay in the shelter, so she needed employment to save money for an apartment.

Brad rewrote her resume to one page and assisted Reeta with her job search and filling out online applications. Within a week, Reeta had an interview. To ensure she could get to the interview and be dressed appropriately, Brad issued her two Goodwill clothing vouchers and two bus passes. Reeta aced the interview and was extended a job offer to which she happily accepted.

Reeta is now a Guest Room Attendant with a prominent hotel and has a second chance to live her life free from violence.
